Selected students complete an eight-week summer internship in the country of their choice. Recent destinations have included Argentina, Columbia, England, France, Ireland, Japan, and South Africa. Mertie Buckman interns can work alongside international leaders in a variety of work environments from businesses to local human rights organizations.

Qualified applicants are rising junior or senior International Studies majors with a minimum overall/major GPA of 3.3 and relevant language skills. Selected students will earn one credit of I.S. 470 and F11 credit.

Landing in Cape Town, I felt an immediate connection to the city. My internship at the Institute of Justice and Reconciliation (IJR) put me headfirst into issues of justice, reconciliation, and social change in South Africa

that garnered diverse responsibilities which has contributed to my growth in understanding transitional justice and policy advocacy globally. From writing policy briefings on democratic challenges in a Post-Apartheid democracy and South Africa's progress with the Sustainable Development Goals to creating graphics under tight deadlines, the support I received, both in the form of constructive criticism and positive reinforcement, was invaluable. My work required me to have conversations about politics, during the historic election period, and to hear and write about hopes and concerns about the coalition government and the ANC losing its outright majority enriched my understanding of democracy. These exchanges taught me the power of progress by means of honest dialogue.

I often went on trips to communities around South Africa, facilitating workshops and conversations. These interactions underscored the shared struggles and hopes across the diaspora. One experience that profoundly impacted me was during a racial dialogue in Montagu. The conversations revealed powerful intergenerational narratives of healing and determination. Engaging with Afrikaaners, Xhosa people, and others in their home language, I learned the importance of listening and recognizing my privilege as an American in these spaces.

This experience has enhanced my skills in policy analysis, graphic design, communications, and community engagement, solidifying

my passion for advocacy and policy work. This internship has equipped me with the knowledge to "expand my mind and change the world." I leave with a profound appreciation for South Africa's potential and the shared humanity that connects us all.
