I am a senior Economics and Mathematics major planning on

pursuing a graduate degree in Economics. I completed my International Internship in Dublin, Ireland with a company called Think Tank for Action on Social Change (TASC). At TASC I completed economic research within the Public Sector focusing on income inequality, essential-worker quality of life, artificial intelligence policy, and pension reform. During this research I contributed to TASC's annual Inequality Report and wrote survey questions that were completed by more than 70,000 Irish citizens. TASC is planning to analyze and report on these survey results in the coming year in an effort to keep pushing for progressive policy reform. I learned a considerable amount about trade unions and pension systems through my research and got a much better grasp on the processes within the public sector.

Outside of work, I also learned about Irish culture through trips organized by my internship provider, Connect123. More importantly, I eventually got the hang of the public bus system! My European escapades also extended to Northern Ireland, Scotland, Belgium, and the Netherlands, where I visited many beautiful and culturally rich cities such as Belfast, Edinburgh, Ghent, and Amsterdam.

Theodore William Eckels International Business Internship:

These internships are awarded annually to outstanding sophomore or junior students with a 3.2+ GPA (overall and major) and a declared major in either the Department of Business or Economics. This award allows students to work abroad for eight weeks during the summer. The internship will cover the cost of airfare and accommodations while living abroad. This is a merit-based scholarship named in honor of business leader Theodore William Eckels to advance the Rhodes Vision to graduate students with a passion for lifelong learning, compassion for others, and the ability to translate academic study and personal concern into effective leadership and action in their communities around the world.

Morelle Legg International Internship for Women:

The Morelle Legg International Internship is awarded to an outstanding female in either the Department of Economics or Business to allow her to obtain work experience in a foreign country during the summer following her junior year. A 3.2+ GPA (overall and in the major) is required. The scholarship covers the cost of an eight week internship including costs related to travel to and from the host country, housing, meals, and incidentals. This is a merit-based scholarship funded by an anonymous donor.

Wasfy Iskander International Internship:

This scholarship is awarded to an outstanding sophomore or junior with a major in the Department of Economics. A 3.2+ GPA (overall and in the major) is required. The purpose of the Wasfy Iskander International Internship is to allow the recipient to obtain work experience in a foreign country for six to eight weeks during the summer. The scholarship pertains to costs associated with commuting to and from the host country, housing, meals, and incidentals. This is a merit-based scholarship named in honor of Economics Professor Wasfy Iskander who taught at Rhodes College from 1969-2002.


