# Rhodes College Highlights and Achievements Spring 2025

(covering January 2024 through January 2025)

Members of the Rhodes College community certainly have something to brag about looking back at last year. The college garnered attention for its curriculum distinctiveness, campus beauty, faculty excellence, student success, outstanding staff, and notable alumni.

July 1, 2024, marked 40 years of the college bearing the name Rhodes College, honoring Dr. Peyton Nalle Rhodes, who served as president from 1949 to 1965. The college had been known as Southwestern at Memphis since 1945, and the Board of Trustees approved the name change in 1984, partly to differentiate it from the many other colleges and universities named Southwestern and to expand the college's national reputation. The college continues to reach the goal of being ranked and recognized nationally.

- Molly Hirner '25 received the Fulbright Canada-Mitacs Globalink Research Internship to conduct advanced health economics research at the University of Waterloo in Ontario during summer 2024.

 Cali VanCleve '26 was selected as a Key into Public Service Scholar by The Phi Beta Kappa Society, and she received the Boren Scholarship to study Russian in Bishkek, Kyrgyzstan.

### Top Prizes at Conferences

- Rhodes Mock Trial program finished in the top ten in the national championship.
- Rhodes Theatre Guild won multiple Ostrander Awards, honoring the best in local theater in the 2023-2024 season.
- Portraits of six members of the Class of 2024—Asya Bray, Sam Frank, Oliver Hurst,
  Claire Kiernan, Hailey Smith, and Justin Thompson—were added to Rhodes College's
  Hall of Fame on the second floor of Southwestern Hall. Selection to the Hall of Fame,
  which was established in 1931, is based on individual merit, leadership in student
  activities, service to others, and overall contributions to the campus community.
- Students led efforts to establish the National Pan-Hellenic Council Plaza, which pays tribute to historically Black sororities and fraternities.
- Rhodes Student Government President Claire Kiernan '24 led efforts to establish the new walking trail on campus.
- At the 2024 commencement, Mia-Miracle Craig and Oliver Hurst were presented the 2024 Algernon Sydney Sullivan Awards for "giving selflessly to the college and others." Blair Kinsey received the Peyton Nalle Rhodes Phi Beta Kappa Prize, the college's highest academic honor, which is awarded to the graduating senior who has best demonstrated an exceptional combination of scholarship, creativity, and achievement and a commitment to the liberal arts and sciences.

- Field Hockey, Women's Swimming, Men's Swimming, and Women's Lacrosse teams won SAA Conference titles.
- Track and Field athletes who ranked nationally include TJ Clayton '24 (100 and 200 meters), Justin Davis '27 (long jump and triple jump), and Olvia Freeman '26 (100 meters).
- More than 200 Rhodes athletes were named to the SAA Spring Honor Roll.
- Dania Verbena '27 received the Premio "Joven Inspiración Guatemalteca" (Young Guatemalan Inspiration Award) from the Congress of the Republic of Guatemala and Jóvenes Artistas por la Justicia Social.
- Rhodes Mock Trial Team A won the inaugural Texas Showdown, an invitational tournament hosted by the University of Texas School of Law Nov. 16-17. Top teams from across the nation competed.
- Rhodes Mock Trial Team Black won the invitational tournament hosted by Missouri State University Nov. 1-3.
- Hunter Rheinfrank '26 was recognized as Best Lobbying CEO and Sofia Lewis '28 as Best Media Reporter '28 at the Tennessee Intercollegiate State Legislature's 55th General Assembly held in Nashville in November 2024.

## **About the Student Population**

The college offers more than 70 majors and minors for students to pursue, and new in the fall 2024 semester was a major in data analytics and a minor in linguistics. Here are other notable stats about the student population.

- Approximately 1,800 students were enrolled for the fall 2024 semester.
- Multicultural and international students make up 38 percent of the student body.
- More than 80 percent of students participate in community service.
- About 70 percent complete at least one internship.
- About 66 percent study abroad or at off-campus sites in the U.S.
- About 40 percent belong to social fraternities/sororities.
- Students are involved in more than 130 student clubs, organizations, and intramural and club sports
- Nearly 30 percent of students play a varsity sport.

## **Outstanding Staff**
